Making a change to your Will



Suki's Story

Poor Suki suffered horrific injuries at the jaws of another dog, while out walking near her home in Sunderland. She was rushed to PDSA where vets carried out emergency surgery. Extensive wounds to Suki's side had damaged her spleen and caused her intestines to prolapse (come out of her body). Certainty

Is there somewhere I can record my Will?

Yes. PDSA has teamed up with the Certainty National Will Register to provide you with free Will registration if you include a gift to PDSA in your Will. The Certainty National Will Register is endorsed by the Law Society. Registration ensures that if your beneficiaries and executors are unaware that you have written a Will or forget where it's located, it can be easily found by conducting a Register Will Search.

All too often Wills are presumed never written or deemed lost so they are difficult to trace, often causing loved ones anguish at a difficult time.

The passage of time, house moves and even malicious destruction are key factors as to why a Will cannot be found when it is needed, so it makes sense to keep a copy safely stored by a third party.

Registering a Will with Certainty takes just seconds and there are no complicated procedures to follow. The only details you need are the name of the practice where your Will was made, the date it was signed and the witnesses' names.

How to register a Will

It's simple, quick and easy:

Log on to www.certainty.co.uk/PDSA and click on 'Register it here'.

Complete the 60-second registration form, filling in the name of the solicitor practice where it was made, the date it was signed and the witnesses' names.

Enter the redemption code 'PDSA 5000'.

Then submit.

Your Will is now registered.

What is a 'codicil'?

When you want to make a small change to your Will you can simply use a 'codicil'. It's a legal document that's signed and witnessed in the same way as your Will is. So it's a way of making absolutely sure your wishes are carried out when you're no longer here.

There's no hard and fast rules about what kind of change a codicil can be used for. Here are some examples:

- Changing an Executor or adding a new one.
- Changing the person or persons you've chosen to inherit the remainder of your estate once all debts, liabilities and specific gifts have been taken care of, known as 'residuary beneficiaries'.
- Leaving a specific amount of money in your Will to a friend, relative or your favourite charity.
- Leaving one of your possessions (for example a piece of jewellery or a painting) as a gift to a friend, relative or your favourite charity.

Of course, you may want to make a bigger change to your Will. Perhaps your circumstances have changed or you've had a change of heart? In that case it's best to think about having a new Will drawn up rather than using a codicil.

How to complete your codicil

It's important to follow these simple steps to make sure your codicil is legally valid:

- 1. Complete the enclosed codicil form.
- 2. Sign each page in the presence of two witnesses,* who also both need to sign as shown on the sample. You can't ask relatives or people who are going to benefit from your Will to be witnesses because, that would invalidate the codicil.
- 3. Make sure the codicil is stored with, but not attached to, your current original Will.

Making sure your codicil is legal

If you're using a codicil to make a change to your Will involving your residuary estate (i.e. what's left over after specific gifts have been made), there's one important thing to remember. When you add together any residuary gifts in your original Will and the codicil, they must come to a total of 100% – no more, no less.

For example, you can leave 50% of your residuary estate to one beneficiary and 50% to another. But you can't leave 60% to one beneficiary and 50% to another or 50% to one and 40% to the other.

Suggested wording

If you would like to leave a gift to PDSA in a codicil to your Will, please insert into the new provisions area one of the following recommended forms of wording:

Wording to include part or all of your estate (residuary legacy)

I GIVE (percentage --%) of the residue of my estate after payment of funeral and testamentary expenses and debts to The People's Dispensary for Sick Animals of Whitechapel Way, Priorslee, Telford, Shropshire TF2 9PQ, Registered charity nos. 208217 and SC037585.

Wording to include a fixed sum of money (pecuniary legacy)

I GIVE absolutely and free of all tax the sum of (£ amount in words and numbers) to The People's Dispensary for Sick Animals of Whitechapel Way, Priorslee, Telford, Shoropshire, TF2 9PQ. Registered charity nos. 208217 and SC037585.

^{*} In Scotland you only need one witness over the age of 16.
