

Everyone loves a chocolate egg at Easter, but for our pets getting their paws on this tasty treat it can have very nasty consequences.

Chocolate contains a toxin called theobromine that can seriously affect the nervous system, as well as causing vomiting and diarrhoea - and, in some cases, it can be fatal. Dark chocolate contains more theobromine than milk chocolate and much more than white chocolate - but any type can be harmful if your sweet-toothed pet scoffs enough of it.

LAMB CUPCAKES

— for — YOUR DOG

These are a delicious meaty treat and ideal for special occasions when you know you will be having a few dogs visiting. It's easier not to use paper cases so you don't have to pull them off before feeding. If you are making these for a special event, why not try 'icing' them with cream cheese and using alfalfa seeds as sprinkles?

Ingredients

- 500g (Ilb 2oz) minced lamb
- 200g (7oz) brown rice flour
- 50g (2oz) porridge oats
- I egg beaten

Nutrition

Kcals/100g (4oz): 620 Protein: 30% Fat: 13%

Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180°C (350°F/gas mark 4). Lightly grease a bun tin.
- 2. Put all the ingredients into a bowl and mix together well.
- 3. Spoon a heaped tablespoon of the mixture into each hole of the bun tin, then bake for 30 minutes until cooked through.
- 4. Leave to cool completely before feeding. They will keep for 5 days in the fridge.
