
ISSUE IN FOCUS: VACCINATION

Key findings

The PAW Report has been a barometer for pet wellbeing in the UK for the last nine years, identifying issues and helping drive positive change.

This year, we surveyed 5,036 adult pet owners to understand the wellbeing of UK pets, and used additional data from 10.000 UK adults to determine the pet population figures.



The UK is a nation of animal lovers. 95% of dog owners, 93% of cat owners and 91% of rabbit owners told us that owning their pet makes them happy. Sadly, being loved doesn't always translate to good wellbeing, and our research shows that many pets are not having their 5 Welfare Needs met (environment, diet, behaviour, companionship and health).

Understanding their needs before getting a pet is the best start, but our Report shows that 21% of current owners had done **no research** before taking on a pet and over a quarter of owners (26%) were unaware of the Animal Welfare Acts, which outline the 5 Welfare Needs.





31% of owners don't know the weight or body condition score of their dog.

55% of owners rely on past experience to train their dogs. 12% of dogs have had no training at all.

1.9 million dogs (19%) are left alone for five or more hours every day.

Only 72% of dogs have had a primary vaccination when young.





with two or more cats provide only one or no litter trays.

56% of owners don't know the weight or body condition score of their cat.

77% of owners

want to change one or more of their cat's behaviours.

43% of cats live in a multi-cat household, which can cause stress.

> Only 61% owners report that their cat has had a primary vaccination when young.



25% of rabbits

are kept in inadequate housing conditions.

26% of owners

didn't provide any hay, which should be a main food for rabbits, and 21% fed muesli as part of their rabbit's main diet.

44% of owners want to change at least one of their rabbits' behaviours.

49% of rabbits

live alone, despite needing the companionship of their own kind.

13% of rabbits get no preventive healthcare.

Preventive health – vaccination (primary and regular boosters)



Vaccinations save lives and protect pets from infectious diseases.

We first noted a reduction in the proportion of pet owners reporting that their dog, cat or rabbit had had a primary vaccination when young in 2017, and this year, our findings show a further drop.

Our findings suggest rising levels of vaccine hesitancy amongst pet owners, so we have focused on this significant issue in this year's Report.
