

3. If possible, collect a large sample – at least half-fill the tube. However, if your dog has severe, watery diarrhoea, this may be very difficult – try to get as much as possible.
4. Screw the lid on firmly and label it with your dog's name and the time and date of collection.
5. Take the sample to your vet practice as soon as possible – a fresh sample is likely to provide the most accurate information.
6. If you have an appointment booked already, collect your sample on the same day, as close to the appointment time as possible.

What is a poo samples tested for?

Your dog's poo sample may be tested for:

- Parasites
- Blood (gut bleeding)
- Bacteria
- Digestion problems and other diseases.

Your vet may check the sample 'in-house' or send it away to a lab for further tests.

When to contact your vet

Always contact your vet for an appointment if you notice something unusual in your dog's poo, such as blood, excessive mucus or worms.

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
